



# Heating and Ventilation

The cottage is heated by electric convectors and underfloor heating and is ventilated non-stop.

## Convectors

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1. On the right side of each convector there is a power button and the thermostat. The power button must be always set for the position 1.
2. To set the comfortable temperature, set the thermostat for the position 3-4 (15-20).
3. Upon vacating the cottage, set all thermostats for the position 2 (10).
4. **Attention!** Do not turn the convectors off when the outside temperature is below +10°C and do not set the thermostats for the position less than 2 (10). This will lead to increased humidity and freezing of the cottage and damage to property and utilities. The cost of repairs may be charged to the Tenant who turned off the heating.



## Ventilation

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To ensure comfortable living conditions, the cottage is equipped with mechanical exhaust system of ventilation. The ventilation control unit is located in the shower room, above the washing machine.

The control unit must always be switched on. The power of ventilation can be adjusted by a choice of modes: from 1 (in winter) to 3 (in summer).

## Underfloor Heating

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1. The underfloor heating control unit is equipped with a power button and a thermostat. The power button must be always switched on.
2. The shower room thermostat is located at the entrance to the shower to the right of the door.
3. The living room thermostat is located in the corner of the living room, next to the TV set.
4. The second bathroom thermostat is located on the wall of the second bathroom.
5. In autumn and winter, the underfloor heating thermostat should be set for at least 3. Do not set the thermostat for the position 2 or less, as it may take more than 24 hours to reheat the floors.
6. Upon vacating the cottage, set the thermostat for 2.
7. **Attention!** Do not turn the underfloor heating off when the outside temperature is below +10°C and do not set the thermostat for less than 2. This will lead to increased humidity and freezing of the cottage and damage to property and utilities. The cost of repairs may be charged to the Tenant who turned off the heating.
